Fremont Amateur "HAM" Radio Enthusiasts join National Deployment Public Demo of Emergency Communications

FREMONT, California, June 15, 2012 -- On June 23rd and 24th, Thousands of Ham Radio operators will be showing off their emergency operating capabilities. Over the past year, the news has been full of reports of ham radio operators providing critical communications.

Amateur Radio – often called "Ham Radio" - was often the ONLY way people could communicate, and hundreds of volunteer "hams" traveled to affected areas to save lives and property. When trouble is brewing, ham radio licensees are often the first to establish communications and provide critical information. During the weekend of June 25th and 26th, the public will have a chance to meet and talk with these ham radio operators and see for themselves what the Amateur Radio Service is all about.

SBARA – South Bay Amateur Radio Association, will be using the newest capabilities for voice communications and even historical Morse code, and satellite communications. Hams from across the USA will be holding public demonstrations of emergency communications.

Field Day, "Hams" annual event, is the climax of the week long "Amateur Radio Week" sponsored by the ARRL, the national association for Amateur Radio.

"We hope that people will come and see for themselves. The communication networks that ham radio operators quickly create which have saved many lives in the past months when other systems failed or were overloaded." "In the Tri-City area, the South Bay Amateur Radio Association, SBARA will be demonstrating Amateur Radio at Fremont's Central Park which is conveniently located at the intersection of Paseo Padre Parkway and Sailway Drive." SBARA invites the public to come and see ham radio's capabilities and learn how to get their own FCC radio license before another disaster strikes. Said Al Rendon, SBARAs Affairs Officer.

Currently, there are more than 704,250 Amateur Radio licensees in the United States, and more than 2.6 million around the world. Through the ARRL's ARES and Fremont's CERT programs, Fremont and other Tri-City ham volunteers provide emergency communications for thousands of state and local emergency response agencies, all for free.
